It is resolved that a poll-site election for an open position on the District board of supervisors will be held on Thursday, March 13, 2025, from 2:30pm until 7:30pm at the Asotin County Conservation Office located at 1397 Port Drive, Clarkston, WA 99403.

SALMON IN THE CLASSROOM

Our annual educational program is starting to ramp up. For many years, the District has teamed up with WA Dept. of Fish and Wildlife and Asotin County schools to give students a hands-on experience with raising fish in the classroom. Students learn about the Salmon life cycle from January – June, all while watching Rainbow Trout eggs transform into fry. We are excited to have nine tanks up and running in elementary, middle, and high school classrooms.

NOXIOUS WEED SPOTLIGHT

Common Teasel is a class C listed species in Washington that grows up to six feet tall and has a stout taproot. Leaves are dark green with a light green midvein, appear wrinkled, and have small spines on the upper leaf surfaces and the underside of the midvein. The stems are hollow, tall, and branched with prickles going up the stem. Stem leaves are opposite and prickly. Flowerheads grow in two rings around the flowerhead and are usually pale or dark purple. Flowerheads have linear prickly bracts at the base. Reproduces solely by seed but can spread rapidly.

Common Teasel invades pastures, roadsides, disturbed areas, along creeks, and pond edges. Rosettes can be dug out by hand but be sure to remove the entire taproot. Mowing can be an effective control method but needs to be repeated throughout the growing season to prevent seeding. There are currently no biological control agents available. Herbicide is an effective control method and has shown the best results when applied to actively growing rosettes. Recommended herbicides include dicamba, imazapic (Plateau), metsulfuron (Escort), and triclopyr. If you have any questions, please contact Kodie Wight at (509) 552-8119 or kodie@asotincd.org.
